
Public health professionals try to prevent problems from happening or recurring through implementing educational programs, recommending policies, administering services and conducting research – in contrast to clinical professionals like doctors and nurses, who focus primarily on treating individuals after they become – sick or injured. The Dunn County report of the Committee on Charities, November 12, 1935, organized a County Health Department. The first meeting was held December 6, 1935 and officers were organized, the second meeting was December 24, 1935 and applications were reviewed for the position of County Nurse. The primary work of the nurse included; an infant and maternal health program, prevention and control of communicable diseases, building up the health of school children, tuberculosis control and crippled children's follow up program.

For the past 80 years, the primary work continues, benefited by advances in science and knowledge about disease process, antibiotics and anti-viral medications now available for treatment and new challenges in the areas of chronic disease, emerging infections related to climate change and environmental health. Our socio-economic climate and health care system also requires Public Health examine ways to promote health equity. In other words, equal opportunities to be healthy.

Health Equity is different from Equality

Health equity is the goal of achieving the highest level of health for all people regardless of differences in social, economic or environmental conditions.

Health related quality of life is also the focus of the Wisconsin 2020 Health Plan. Wisconsin's Health Plan describes the essential elements of working toward optimal public health as; effective policies and health systems, healthy, safe and resilient communities, families and individuals, reduced disease, injury and disability leading toward the goals of improved health across the lifespan and health equity. It was encouraging to hear the County Board supervisors identify health as a priority during the directional planning process. This indicates an awareness of community

concerns about quality of life related to policies and their potential impact in areas of health, which is a significant component of quality of life.

Our updated Community Health Needs Assessment (2016-2021) identified the following priorities:

- Obesity, Physical Activity & Nutrition
- Mental Health
- Alcohol & other Drug Abuse
- Environment-Natural Resources & Sustainability & the "Built" environment

We partnered with Red Cedar-Mayo and schools and agencies that serve Dunn County for the current assessment process and will continue to work together to implement strategies to address the priorities.

WI 2020-Health Focus Area

Infrastructure: Access to quality Health Services

Program areas:

Public Health Multipurpose Clinics-walk-in and scheduled appointments for TB skin tests, shots, Blood Pressure checks, health education and referrals.

Referrals requiring follow-up-**41** (38)

WWWP-Wisconsin Well Women Program for uninsured or underinsured women ages 50-64 years, enrollment visits with a PHN result in access to pap tests and mammograms. This program transitioned to a regional center in Eau Claire County in July of 2015 **Number of women screened- 10** (61)

Children and Youth with Special Health Care Needs: We act as a link to family support services with the Regional Center for CYSHCN. In 2015 our mini-grant funding for this program was cut by Chippewa County.

InSPIRE Grant Collaboration with Menomonie School District- Teen parent programming and risk reduction for all students. Our staff provide mini-seminars on topics important to adolescents. The evaluations indicate increased learning.

Prenatal Care Coordination Program-

Women enrolled in Medical Assistance and assessed by the PHN are eligible for this program. The main goal is to improve birth outcomes. The PHNs are the link to early identification of pregnancy, individual support services, receiving early and continuous prenatal care, health and nutrition ed., referrals to community services and accessing and obtaining health and community services.

Number of PNCC clients- 137(150) 298 (533) visits

Oral health care-In 2015 the department provided education, screening and toothbrushes with visits for immunizations, the infant program holiday party and referrals for dental care to area dentists and RHDC. The RHDC now is a new Marshfield site for a dental center. Only the city of Menomonie and Elk Mound have fluoridated water systems.

Fluoride supplements: 149 (194) children.

Fluoride rinse program: **625** (881) public school children.

Fluoride is the least expensive and most effective way to reduce tooth decay.

Partners in oral health programs-Head Start, CVTC, area dental and medical providers, area schools, fluoridated municipal water systems.

Adequate, Appropriate & Safe Food & Nutrition

The WIC program (Women, Infants and Childhood Nutrition) provides nutrition education and breastfeeding support (initiation rate 73.8% (70.4%)) for Dunn County families as well as supplemental food vouchers to families at or below 185% poverty level. The WIC program was established in 1974 and has earned the reputation of being one of the most successful federally-funded nutrition programs in the U.S.

Food insecurity is an issue in Dunn County.

The Environmental Health program inspects and licenses food establishments and the Farmer's Market. We also inspect vendors at community events.

Radon Information Center-Dunn County coordinates the program testing information and supplies for Dunn, St. Croix, Pierce, Barron and Sawyer Counties. Any elevated test results require follow-up by the Environmental Health Specialist in the county of the test.

Well Water and Surface Water Protection- We continue to partner with citizen groups, DNR and the zoning office to protect the groundwater and surface water. The health department offers information about private well water testing as well as test kits. Our website includes test result data for nitrates in Dunn County.

We have many public health partners in Environmental Health, including the DNR and local environmental protection groups. We are dedicated to protecting our valuable natural resources within our scope of authority and as it directly relates to protecting the health of the public.

Lead Poisoning Prevention and Investigation-

Families receive lead poisoning prevention screening, tests, and if any levels are elevated, a visit by the EHS and PHN to determine risks and remediation.

The Environmental Health Specialist provides community education for future food service managers, home builders, realtors and other individuals/groups.

Complaints by citizens re: well water, housing, mold, licensed facilities, hazardous waste-**87** (93) complaints were followed up and resolved by the EHS.

We contract with La Crosse County to provide habitat surveillance for mosquito-borne disease and work on education about removal of standing water vessels (including discarded tires.)

Reproductive and Sexual Health

Reproductive Health program-Two NPs and one part time support staff person provided health screening, information, referral and treatment for Dunn County women of childbearing age, men seeking prevention/treatment services and help with medical assistance enrollment.

Women receiving Early Identification of Pregnancy program services (pregnancy testing) **102** (264)

Number of RH clients- Total-684 (748) unduplicated clients and a total of: 2148 (2560) visits.

Community education-PH staff nurse work with schools, agencies and parents, teaching about sexuality issues, healthy relationships and resources.

HIV/STD testing, referral, treatment and education is available within this program.

The HIV follow up has changed to a regional center with Eau Claire County providing the service.

Partners collaborating in outreach for sexual health and education and prevention of risks include; The Bridge, Law Enforcement (City and County), UW-Stout, Marshfield Clinic & Red Cedar-Mayo, WI ARC and WI Department of Public Health.

Chronic Disease and Injury Prevention

Car Seat Safety program-we provide car seat safety checks for families and have grant funding to provide education and car seats on a sliding fee schedule for donations.

Total number of seats provided & checked –**128** (116)

Safe Kids Day –Health Department staff provide car seat safety education and demonstrations.

We collaborate with Dunn Co. Solid Waste, Lion's club, Community Health Foundation and RCMC for safe medication and sharps disposal.

WIC and public health/RH: nutrition/diabetes prevention referrals, education and counseling. The prevalence of diabetes risk factors in Dunn County is 8.9% (2013 est.) for all ages of adults.

Our public health clinic is available for blood pressure screening and referral.

We include Back to sleep and Shaken Baby information in our parent teaching for SIDS and Shaken Baby risk reduction. This year we implemented a new project with MCH program direction called "The Period of Purple Crying" for new parents.

Early Childhood Safety Meetings- These partner agencies are interested in continuing to receive safety messaging distributed through schools, day cares and medical providers. The health department sends Safe Kids messaging for each month and Marshfield clinic provides the brochures. This is also included in parent website messaging from schools.

Mental Health

Postpartum depression screening- Perinatal depression screening is included in the PNCC and WIC programs.

The Public health nursing staff are updating the perinatal and postpartum screening tool and have participated in webinars re: implementing the Edinburgh screening tool. Women won't be screened except in person (not over the phone) but

with changes in client visits we have determined we will try it and assess the usefulness.

Mental Health Resource Network: We are partners with other agencies to keep up to date with trends and resources as well as program sharing and development.

The Health Department updates the Dunn County Mental Health Resource brochure. It is posted on our website.

We work with DCHS, UW-Stout, RCMC, Marshfield Clinic, schools and other partners to provide referrals for mental health services.

Tobacco Use and Exposure

PHNs are trained in 5A's assessment and motivational counseling. Eligible clients are screened and referred using the 5 A's assessment.

Partners in programming; Wisconsin DPH, American Cancer Society, American Lung Association, School Districts, Mayo-Menomonie, Marshfield Clinic, Arbor Place.

Communicable Disease Prevention and Control

WI Statute HFS 145 requires all reportable communicable diseases to be directed to the local public health agency for investigation, control and prevention of any spread among the population. The WI Electronic Disease Surveillance System-**WEDSS** connects with CDC reporting and we also rely on timely communication from providers.

TB skin testing was provided for **466** (541) persons. In addition we arrange confirmatory serum testing for TB infection (LTBI) in 2015 we provided blood testing for **4** (2) individuals. We coordinated LTBI (preventive) treatment for **5** (6) people.

Vaccines for Children-In 2015-

73% (76%) of Dunn County children under the age of 2 years were up to date with immunizations. We work with schools & the medical community to encourage vaccinations. Our immunization clinic visits have decreased with ACA coverage of shots. Our school summary report indicates there are still a significant number of students whose parents choose not to immunize, the majority of waivers are for "personal" reasons.

Influenza Vaccine-The flu season isn't over as of March 17th, while I'm writing this we have 7 cases of Dunn County people hospitalized with Influenza A. In 2015 we totaled 13 cases of influenza associated hospitalizations. This year the vaccine is closely matched with the prevalent virus. We continue to encourage the population to be immunized against Vaccine Preventable

Diseases. DCHD gave a total of **359** (450) adult flu shots and **90** (154) children's flu shots in 2011.

Health Screening Stepping Stones Shelter-

Homeless individuals often need assistance accessing health care, and are identified as a population at risk for Tuberculosis. We coordinate with the House of Hope social worker to provide general health screening and referral services with homeless families and individuals. In 2015 we received **36** (59) referrals.

We continue our partnership with the Aids Resource Center of WI to provide free condoms in Dunn County locations. We have provided over **5430** (8145) free condoms to **4** bars and **5** (5) agencies. We also serve as an extension of the ARC site for their outreach prevention services and staff meet Dunn County residents in our offices the first Friday of the month to offer education and risk reduction. This is one evidence based strategy with strong support that is part of the response to the known use of heroin/opiates in Dunn County. Our workgroup report will be completed in the next 30 days.

Below are case counts of communicable diseases that have been reported to the health department over a three-year period. We receive electronic reports from the WI State Lab of Hygiene, Marshfield Clinic, Mayo Health Systems, UW-Stout, area hospitals. Other reports are phoned in to the health department. We investigate all cases of reportable communicable disease to prevent/control disease spread and protect the public's health.
