### Data Dashboard Companion Document

**Jail Data:** The Jail data is compiled from statistics drawn from Jail bookings. The average daily population, along with the percentage breakdowns by Huber, Electronic Monitoring (EM), etc., are the averages for 7 days within the month. The total number of bookings, sex, race, and recidivism data are exact. Recidivism is calculated on people brought in on new charges or Probation (PO) Holds since 1999. It does not count people returning for the sole purpose of serving a sentence.

**Court Text Messaging System:** The Court System has the ability to send a text message to parties that have a court case or are involved in a case within the court system. Using text messaging as a reminder creates an additional tool to improve on-time Court appearances for parties, victims and witnesses. The Text Messaging system allows court staff to send a text message to the cell phone of a party on a case. Automated messages are sent by the system two days prior to the scheduled court type activity. The text messaging function is intended as an enhancement to the existing notification process, and does not replace other notices generated by the court system.

**Proxy:** The Law Enforcement Proxy for Dunn County is a quick and simple risk screener that can be used by law enforcement to identify a general recidivism risk score by looking at three static factors of an individual: current age, age of first arrest, and number of prior arrests. Menomonee Police Department (MPD), Dunn County Sheriff's Office (DUSO), and UW-Stout Police Department have been utilizing the Proxy since 2016. The Proxy form is utilized as a mechanism for law enforcement to make a direct referral to the Pre-Charge Diversion Program. The Proxy data is also examined to identify local drivers of criminal behavior in Dunn County. The Proxy cutoff scores have been informed by a program evaluation recommendation, but have not been validated.

**Pre-Charge Diversion Program:** The Pre-Charge Diversion Program is for first time/low risk offenders who are given an opportunity to self-correct and to divert them from the formal criminal court process. Eligibility is determined by reviewing the offenders completed proxy, CCAP history, nationwide criminal history, and Protect. Agreements are generally six (6) months in length. Agreements include the conditions that the offender must: inform the District Attorney's Office within 24 hours of any address change, have no further criminal violations, including any related ordinance violations, view an online educational video and complete a Thinking Report, complete community service at a non-profit agency and provide documentation, and any other conditions related to the referred offense (mental health assessment, AODA assessment, restitution, etc.).

**Deferred Acceptance of a Guilty/No Contest Plea (DAGP) Agreements:** DAGPs are agreements which can also divert individuals from the formal Court process. These agreements may be used for individuals who may not be eligible for a Pre-Charge Diversion Agreement due to the offense, those with felony charges, or those who have prior convictions/not low-risk. Generally, agreements last between 12-36 months. If the agreement is successfully completed, the criminal charge may be dismissed or amended to a lesser charge.

**Dunn County Treatment Court:** Dunn County Treatment Court, formerly Dunn County Diversion Court, started in 2008. The mission of Dunn County Treatment Court is to increase community safety by providing intensive, court monitored programming that is focused on individual alcohol, drug, and mental health recovery to break the cycle of addiction and crime. This is accomplished through a multidisciplinary team who have committed themselves to working with high risk/high need individuals to better their lives. The Dunn County Treatment Court strives to use evidence based and best practices and follows the nation's research driven drug court model.

**Dunn County Treatment Opportunity Program (TOP):** The Dunn County Treatment Opportunity Program (TOP), formerly called the Dunn County Treatment Alternative and Diversion (TAD) Program, started in 2017. The purpose is to divert non-violent offenders who have been charged with or convicted of a crime that is related to the person's use or abuse of alcohol or other drugs away from the criminal justice system. This is done by offering a diversion program option that provides case-managed treatment alternatives to prosecution and incarceration. The main components of the program are case management, drug testing, and referrals and treatment monitoring for accountability.

**Jail Assessment Process:** Mental health and substance abuse screeners and pretrial risk assessment are used when meeting with individuals on the jail intake list each day. The screeners are also used for referrals to TOP, Treatment Court, and Jail to Community Reentry Project.

- **GAIN-SS** (Global Appraisal of Individual Needs-Short Screeners) 20 items comprised of four screeners to identify or rule-out individuals with behavioral health disorders (internalizing disorder, externalizing disorder, substance disorder, crime/violence disorder). Score ranges from 0-5 in each of the four screeners (0 Low, 1-2 Moderate, 3-5 High).
- **TCU-V** (Texas Christian University Drug Screen) Self-report of substance use within the last 12 months. Frequency of use, history of treatment, symptoms, motivation for treatment. Score ranges from 0-11, none, mild, moderate, severe.
- **Pretrial Risk Assessments:** COMPAS (Correctional Offender Management Profiling for Alternative Sanctions) and VPPRAI (Virginia Pretrial Risk Assessment Instrument Revised) are used to identify risk of failure to appear, identify risk of pretrial misbehavior, and to identify risk of who should remain in custody. Three M's: Maximize Appearance, Maximize Public Safety, Maximize Release.

**Jail to Community Reentry Project:** Started in January 2018 with state grant funds, the Jail to Community Project is a volunteer option for jail inmates to receive assistance with transition planning aimed at reducing recidivism.
